



'Give me more money than my brother and a room full of sweets,' the other brother said.


Suddenly, there were sweets and money everywhere. The brothers began to fight.



The boy pointed at some rocks. 'Shall we look there?' he whispered.


Between the rocks there were lots of pools of sea water. They were full of small fish and shells.

'What do you mean?' his mother asked.


'That's my secret!' Robert said.


## What do you want to be one day?


This made Big Nose unhappy, so he only went into the village when he needed to buy chocolate or a new handkerchief.




## Brilliant bikes!

'She's going to win,' thought Katy.


'You're next!' called Mr White, and pointed to Paul and Katy.

'I'll invite my grandma,' laughed Katy. 'She really loves your music! But some of my friends will come with me too.'


Alex smiled. 'What about you, Paul?' he asked.





'Do you drink this or wash in it?' the space monster asked.


'Jump in it and see!' William answered.

'Well,' the teacher said. 'William, that's the strangest story you've ever told me. I don't believe any of it!'






